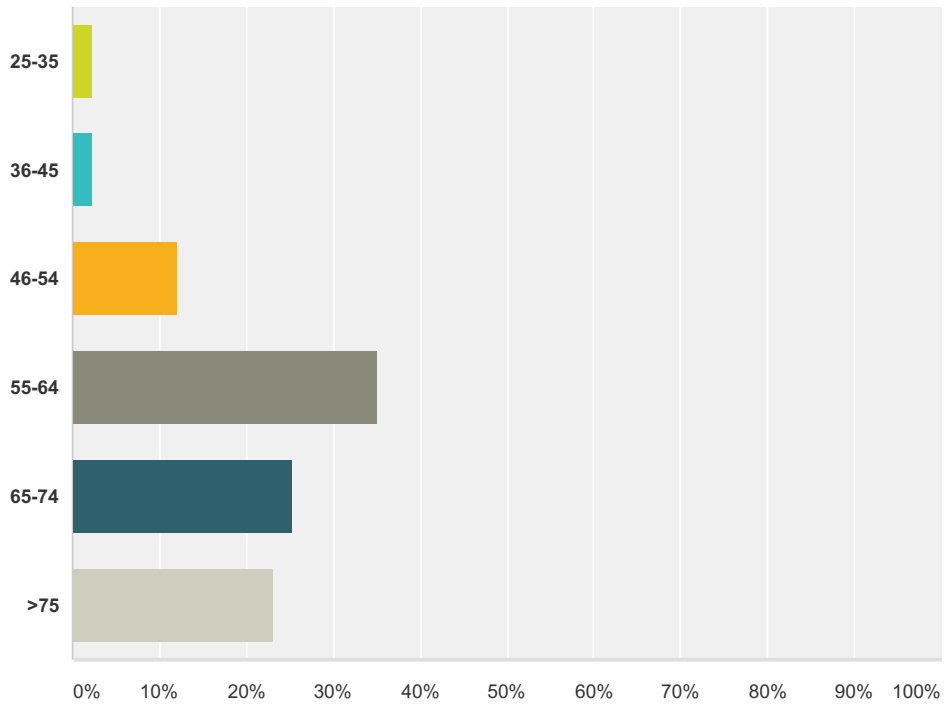

Q5 Please select your age range.

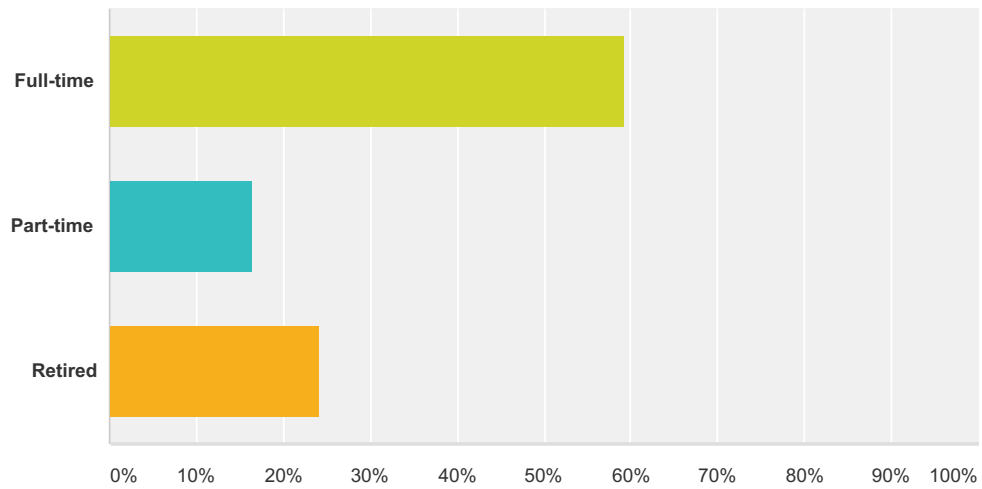

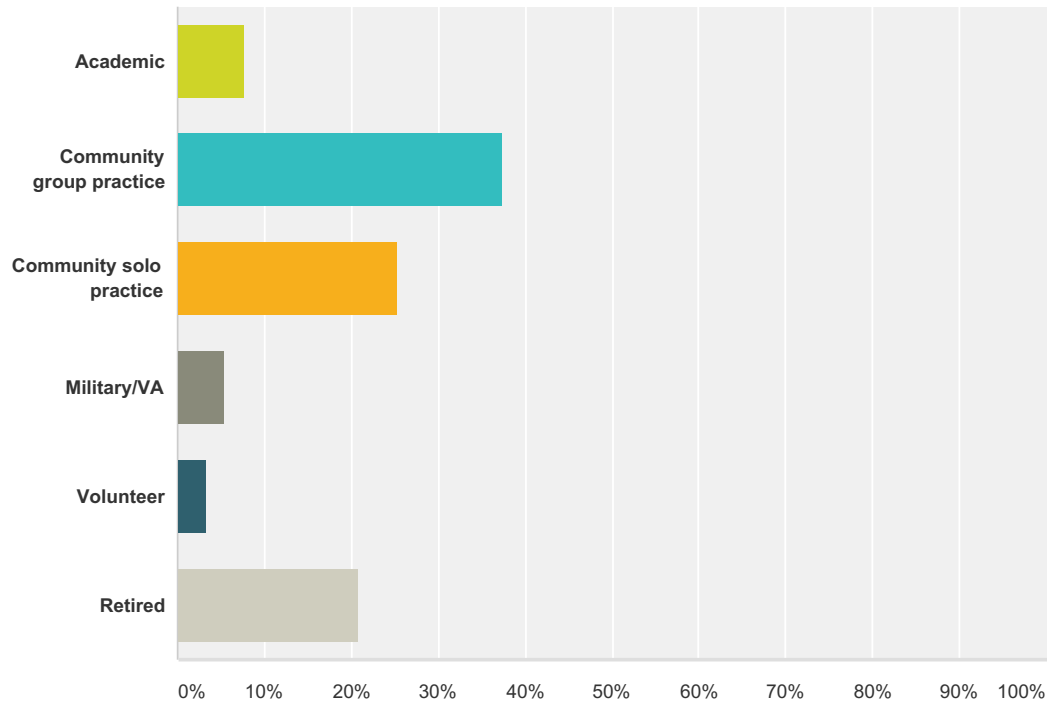

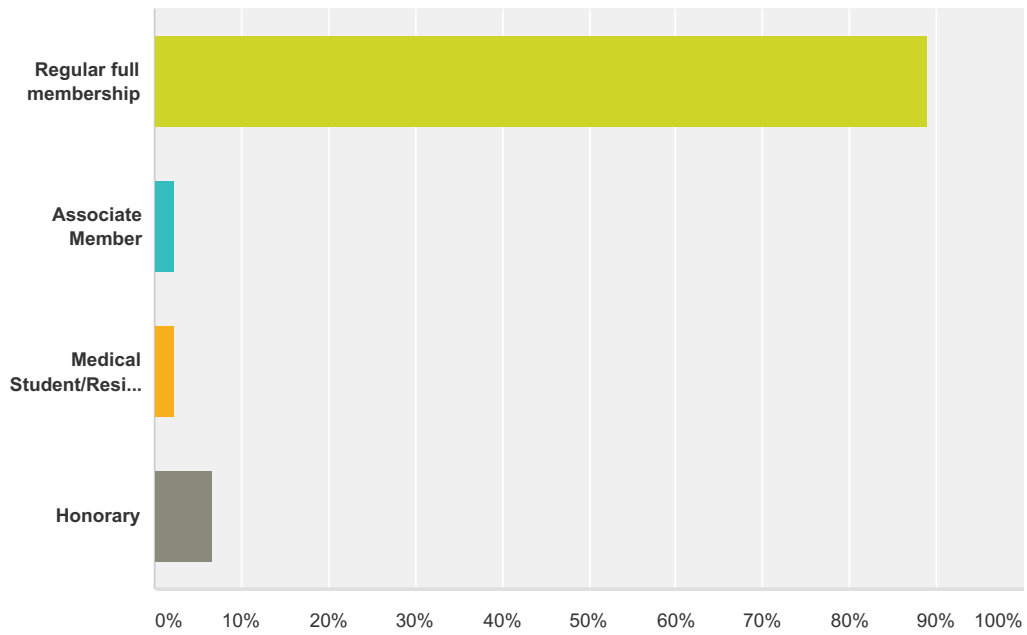
